This article appeared on the front page of Section B (Local & State) of the Lansing State Journal last Sunday, October 8, 2006. It was reported that rather than waiting until the upperclassmen years, East Lansing hopes its new program will get struggling teens on track before they lose too many credits, or worse, interest!

So what works?

According to the sunday article, research suggests that successfull programs for ninth–graders feature:

- \* REALISTIC GOALS developed by all involved.
- \* PHYSICAL SPACE, which could be a wing, a school–within–a–school, or a separate building.
- \* A DOUBLE LOAD of math and language arts.
- \* A RIGOROUS CURRICULUM with a demonstrated link to real life.
- \* A CONNECTION TO CARING ADULTS who support them are, in turn, supported by their educational community.

\* SCHOOL-BASED ASSISTANCE TEAMS consisting of teachers, counselors, parents/guardians and people from agencies involved in the teens's life.

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4. IEA General Assembly opens in Amiens, France.

At 07:54:38 AM 09 Oct 2006, Jack Schwille wrote:

FYI. Today the 47th annual General Assembly of the International Association for the Evaluation of Educational Achievement (known as IEA, sponsor of TIMSS, TEDS and other cross-national research studies) opened here in the university town of Amiens, France, north of Paris--site of one of France's most famous medieval cathedrals.

The meeting was opened by the Minister of National Education of France, who also happens to be a politician from Amiens--not a coincidence I think that the meeting is being held here. He was accompanied by the Rector of Amiens, the ministry official who is in charge of all public education from preschool to university in this region. The minister was very complimentary in telling how important IEA studies are to French educational policymaking.

IEA is apparently in the best shape ever. Six studies are being conducted at the same time--more than ever before. They include our teacher education study (TEDS); plus TIMSS and PIRLS (a reading assessment) and Advanced TIMSS (for students taking advanced math or physics at the end of secondary school)--all three of these studies are run by Boston College; SITES (an educational technology study; and the third civic education and citizenship study, run by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER), who are also our partners on TEDS.

The individual studies get bigger and bigger; one now has 67 countries participating if I remember right. Although only 39 countries had representatives present at Amiens this morning and only about 60 actually belong to IEA, a total of 90 countries are now participating in the studies. Tom Loveless of the Brookings Institution represents the U.S. in the IEA General Assembly and is a member of its standing committee which helps Hans Wagemaker the executive director run the organization between GA meetings.

The IEA Data Processing Center in Hamburg is booming. It works not only on the six IEA studies but does other contract work as well. It now employs about 100 people.

The IEA secretariat in Amsterdam has special responsibility for verification of translation of the data collection instruments. This now means working in over 60 different languages.

In the absence of Teresa Tatto, who returned to East Lansing this morning to work on putting the TEDS instruments in final form for our March 2007 field test and Lawrence Ingvarson from ACER who is about to have some surgery, Glenn Rowley (also of ACER)

and I will be giving the TEDS progress report to the IEA General Assembly tomorrow afternoon. Wish us luck!

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## 7. WikiPlaces: The Essence of Your Favorite Places.

Do any of your classes study a country or a city? Study your own community or neighborhood? Does your school have a photography class that needs a focus? If so, they may be interested in a free, online project titled WikiPlaces: The Essence of Your Favorite Places (An Online Project)

This project is open to all ages. Participants are asked to help us see the essence of a place by creating an alphabet book page for that place. For each letter, tell us a word and include a photo of that object. This may be a simple type of alphabet book with just the word and its image (e.g. M is for Mosque) or it may include information about the object (e.g. H is for Hornbill. Hornbills live in the tropical rain forests of S.E. Asia. They are important members of the rain forest ecosystem because of the role they play in seed dispersal.)

Participants are not required to address all 26 letters for their place. In fact, leaving some letters blank invites others to add to your pages. Pages are easily edited and revised.

How to Take Part?

1. Go to <http://wikiplaces.wetpaint.com>.

2. Explore the site, especially the home page, the Getting Started <<http://wikiplaces.wetpaint.com/page/Getting+Started>> page and a page in progress, such as Egypt <<http://wikiplaces.wetpaint.com/page/Egypt>>.

If you are new to using a wiki, you may want to look at the Wetpaint help page <<http://faq.wetpaint.com/help#top>>.

3. Choose a place. It could be a country, a region, a city, a neighborhood, a building or even a room.
4. Brainstorm what features, elements, objects make that place unique -- or what makes it special to you.
5. Gather images. You could take photos, use a drawing program to draw your own JPEG pictures, or find photos via Creative Commons in Flickr.
7. Log in and start adding to Wikiplaces. If there is already a page in progress for your place, add to it. Don't worry that you are editing someone else's page. That's how wikis work. Or, if you'd rather, create another page for that place.

If there isn't already a page, add one. You might want to copy and paste this template <<http://wikiplaces.wetpaint.com/page/Template>> text onto your page to get your page going quickly.

8. Celebrate by inviting friends and family to view and leave comments on the pages you created.
